The meeting was held in person at the Irvington Presbyterian Church, open to the public, and called to order by Sue Beecher at 7:00 pm who opened the meeting by welcoming Council members, guests, and public attendees.

Approval of Minutes: The minutes for the previous month, April 2023, were approved virtually.

Updates:

- A donation of \$2,500 to the IUMC playground from Beastside Brewfest proceeds was approved
- A donation of \$2,500 to the Pourhouse from Beastside Brewfest proceeds was approved

Tamar Harper, Community Resource Supervisor, IMPD East District (30652@indy.gov)

- Slow Roll Bike Ride, May 17th @ 6pm at Grace Tuxedo Baptist Church
- Number 1 complaint lately has been speeding, and is similar in other neighborhoods it was also the number one complaint brought up at a recent law enforcement conference
- Another frequent issue is squatters the more reports the better
- 2pm-5pm weekdays on Poplar, speeding to avoid traffic jams at Washington and Emerson
- Most police runs do not involve lights and sirens only if there is a life in imminent danger
- If police stop for a traffic infraction and the person flees, the officer is not supposed to pursue
- Graffiti: Report to Mayor's Action Center if you find graffiti, but if you catch someone actually applying the graffiti then call 911
- IMPD is still 150 officers short of what they need in order to enforce at the levels they need to
- If you hear shots fired, call 911 to report it so that the data can be logged and patterns can be drawn

Update from Blake Johnson, State Representative, District 100

- 4 month legislative session closed a few weeks ago
- SB 283 Road funding formula fix to include the populations of excluded cities into Marion County's road funding formula. Current formula only funds based on the length of center lane miles, regardless of width.
- Vision Zero Task Force language was passed through a house bill, which will work on pedestrian safety solutions, such as school and work zone camera enforcement, intersection design, etc.
- Work zone safety camera enforcement passed
- No Turn On Red: Indianapolis planned to enforce this throughout the downtown core. However, the Senate banned this policy in consolidated cities in Indiana which is just Indianapolis. This bill had an emergency clause, meaning it went into effect immediately upon signature of the Governor.

- Low Barrier Shelters: Most shelters for unhoused people have high barriers to entry that make it hard for many people to access housing. Some provisions of a bill to address this were folded into the budget, including about \$20 million in funding. Shelters would be funded through an economic enhancement district but would run locally between the City and service providers.
- Machine guns were redefined to include glock switches 3D printed tech that can turn a regular handgun into a machine gun. This effectively bans glock switches and allows for enforcement.
- Teachers are already allowed to be armed in Indiana if a school district allows it. A bill passed this year to allow funding for training teachers to use handguns if they are to be armed in schools. Language around safe storage information was added to the bill.
- Budget increased private school voucher eligibility to 400% of free-and-reduced price lunch eligibility income levels, which amounts to a \$1 billion increase, without increases in funding to public schools.
- Funding for mental health supports had a goal of \$130 million annually, but only passed the budget with \$50 million annually.
- Scholarship has been funded for the year! After beginning in 2016 about \$70,000 have been committed.
- Budget surplus is estimated around \$4-\$6 billion.

Brianna Owens, Irvington Community Advocacy Network (ICAN) Program Director

- 299 clients assisted as for April 30th of this year, 30% of clients served no longer need services
- Founded in 1997 in a collaboration among Irvington ministries (Irvington Association of Ministers)
- ICAN has two ministries:
 - $\circ \quad \text{ICAN Assistance Center is in Irvington United Methodist Church (open to all) 10am-1pm} \\$
 - o ICAN Food Pantry is at Downey Avenue Christian Church (open to zip code) Thursdays 1pm-3pm
- ICAN lacked a leader for 7 months and is now rebuilding after a few missed grant cycles
- Includes a clothing closet, provides personal care items, connects clients to transportation services
- ICAN also provides referrals to outside agencies that have better-fit resources, especially mental health
- Goals: Advocacy, Increase Grants/Donations, Collaborate with Partners

 - o Monthly food giveaways in partnership with other organizations like Big Red Food Box (May-Sept)

- o IUMC Strawberry Festival coming up
- o June 24th will have a large giveaway including small kitchen appliances and school supplies
